KEL ERO Review 2023

KEL has recently been notified that the Education Review Office will be reviewing our Centre in May this year. This is part of the regular review process carried out by ERO.

It will be an Akarangi | Quality Evaluation Review. That is, reviewers will evaluate the extent to which KEL has the learning and organisational conditions to support equitable and excellent outcomes for all tamariki.
